Wave Four - 2023



Willingness to serve on a jury is extremely low in Canada. Economic concerns are the key drivers for willingness to serve on a jury.



KEY FINDINGS

- Canadians' willingness to serve on a jury remains <u>extremely low</u> and largely unchanged in four years of tracking
- Willingness to serve on a jury has dropped significantly in Ontario over four years of tracking
- More Canadians are willing to donate blood and volunteer in the community than serve on a jury
- Canadians are very unfamiliar with the jury system in Canada including Criminal and Civil juries, and Coroner's Inquests
- Maintaining wages and salaries, paid parking and expenses, and higher jury pay are the driving factors for willingness to serve on a jury




ACTIONS


- Increase jury pay to a minimum of \$120 per day beginning on day 1 of service (as recommended by the House of Commons Justice Committee in 2018)
- Provide free (safe and secure) parking options for jurors in close proximity to courthouses
- Improve information on Provincial and Territorial websites about jury duty, roles and responsibilities and expectations – including video formats
- Compensate jurors for mileage and travelling expenses
- Compensate jurors for childcare and elder care expenses
- Continue to promote mental health and self care for jurors during jury service




Willingness to serve on a jury is low across Canada, and has remained consistent in four years of tracking. More Canadians are willing to donate blood, and volunteer in the community.



Willingness to serve on a jury is lowest in Ontario, and highest in Eastern and Western Canada. Willingness to serve on a jury in Ontario has been decreasing over four years of tracking, and increasing in the West.

"I would be missing a lot of work"

"Loss of income, public forum with important Decisions that effect others life not appealing"

"I've never been asked. I wonder if the trauma of seeing horrible things would be difficult to live with"


I have a minimum wage job and I can't afford to miss work. The daily jury amount will be less and my employer does not pay me for jury duty."

Don't want to lose getting paid from work. Cost of living is too high and I need my salary.

"I am the main bread winner of the family so if I'm spending time in a jury, I lose money and family can't eat"


Canadians are largely unfamiliar with jury service with less than one in ten familiar with the Criminal Trial Process







Economics are the driving factor for willingness to serve on a jury - including maintaining wages/salaries; paid parking and expenses; higher jury pay.
